Course Description:

This course will present you with an understanding of International Relations, one of the subfields of Political Science. This field studies a broad range of political, economic, and social relationships between and within countries. In this course, you will learn the content of the field as well as how political scientists conduct research in IR and the relevance of that research for general knowledge.

In order to cover such a broad area of study, the course will be divided into three sections. The first covers the foundational concepts of international relations: the actors, the nature of power, and the paradigms used to explain international phenomena. The second section focuses on security and highlights the causes of conflict, the management of conflict, and – ultimately – the prevention of conflict. The final section investigates economic security and highlights concepts such as international trade, economic development, and economic statecraft. In this course, you will learn:

- How political scientists use data to study broad questions in International Relations
- The assumptions and expectations of the major paradigms, including Realism, Liberalism, Constructivism, Marxism, and Feminism
- How these paradigms apply to topics such as conflict, economics, and diplomacy
- How specific theories explain the onset, duration, and outcomes of conflict.
- How cooperation between countries can endure in the presence of anarchy
- Theories of international political economy; the promise of free trade and the perils of protectionism

Exams 1 & 2 - The exams will be taken in class and consist of 20-30 questions and a short essay.

Map & Reading Quizzes – In order to become an informed observer of the world, it is important that you have a good grasp of geography. As a result, you will be given five map quizzes. Each quiz will focus on one particular region of the world. A list of the regions and the particular state information that you need to know will be provided on D2L. The regions include: 1. Central and South America, 2. Northern Africa and the Middle East, 3. Sub-Saharan Africa, 4. East Asia & Oceania, and 5. Central and South Asia. The particular dates of the map quizzes will be provided on D2L. All five of these quizzes will count towards your final grade.

In addition to the map quizzes, I will also conduct six reading quizzes. These will take place randomly throughout the semester and they will concern the reading that is due for that day. These are meant to ensure that you do the reading. During the reading quizzes, you may use 1 page of notes (both sides of the page can be used) to assist you. This is to encourage you to take notes while you read and to build up a supply of notes to assist you in preparation for the exams. An additional bonus is that these questions have a habit of showing up on the two exams. I will keep the best 5 quizzes. Students who miss a quiz will not be allowed to make it up, unless the student was participating in a school-sponsored event or military service and only if I am made aware of the absence beforehand. These quizzes – map and reading – are worth 15% of your final grade.

Project – The final project involves using the Google Tour Builder (https://tourbuilder.withgoogle.com) to develop an interactive map of an International Relations concept (a state, international organization, a past international event, a global phenomenon, etc). The platform allows you incorporate texts, maps, images, and video to help us better understand your concept and where it occurs. This is your chance to be creative, so be bold. We will discuss this in more detail over the course of the semester.

For now, I have established several dates by which I would like to see certain elements of your tour. I will grade the individual components and provide comments. These will be due prior to class. This is to allow you plenty of time to complete the project and for me to provide you with feedback:

- Friday, September 7th: An abstract describing generally what your tour will be about. Discuss the IR issue you have chosen, the stops you've chosen, and the information you will use. Once this is approved by me, you can move on to the next stages.
- Monday, October 1st: An annotated bibliography with at least 5 sources. (2% of grade)
- Wednesday, October 24th: 1st Draft due. In this, I want your tour stops and the accompanying text decided. Individual elements (photos, videos, etc) do not have to be decided. (5% of grade)
- Monday, November 5th: Peer Review Due. You will receive a link to an anonymous student's tour and you will provide anonymous, quality comments. The grade will be determined by the quality of your comments. (3% of grade)
- Friday, November 30th: Final Submission. You will send me a link via email (by 11:59 pm) to a Youtube video of your tour. I will grade the tour based on a rubric I will distribute at a later time. (10% of grade)

Final Exam - The final exam will be taken in class and is cumulative. It will also consist of 35-40 questions, a short essay about a topic covered in the exams, and a longer essay integrating everything we have learned.

Attendance/Participation - Students are expected to attend class and complete all of the required readings prior to class. I will take attendance at the beginning of class. Late arrivals will be noted. Each student is allowed three (3) "grace days" before absences (excused or unexcused) begin to impact the final grade. This grade will be calculated proportionally to your actual attendance. School-sponsored events and military service will not deduct from the allotted grace days, however you must alert me ahead of the absence. Neither school-sponsored events nor military service are excuses for failing to turn in an assignment on time. If you miss class, you are responsible for obtaining notes and any pertinent class news from a classmate.
