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# **Course Description:**

This course explores the impact of globalization on international politics. Globalization is a complex phenomenon that influences many different aspects of political, economic and social life. Specifically, we will study how globalization affects the international economy, the spread of culture, democratization, human rights, and security. In the first half of the course, we focus on the benefits of globalization while in the second half, we look at its consequences.

Midterm – The exam will be taken in class and consist of 20-30 questions and a short essay.

<u>Final</u> - The final exam will be taken in class and is cumulative. It will also consist of 35-40 questions, a short essay about a topic covered in the exams, and a longer essay integrating everything we have learned.

<u>Unannounced Quizzes</u> – During the course of each week (with some exceptions), I will randomly conduct a quiz. These will be given in class and will concern the reading that is due for that day. The format will be multiple choice. These are meant to ensure that you do the reading. If you read, these should be relatively simple. An additional bonus is that these questions have a habit of showing up on the exams. I will count the 10 highest quizzes towards your grade.

<u>Paper</u> – Students will be expected to write a 10 page paper focusing on the impact of globalization (however defined) on the interaction of individuals or states. The paper assignment will be twofold – one due date concerns a preliminary outline and bibliography (10% of your grade) and the second regards the completed paper (15%). A more detailed explanation will be given during a later class.

Attendance/Participation - Students are expected to participate actively in class and contribute to class discussion. In addition, attendance is obviously important. Late arrivals will be noted and repeated instances of being late will negatively affect your grade. In regards to absences, please contact me before class if you are unable to attend. Please note that attending and participating are two different things – just regular attendance without participation will be considered "average"; as a result, this portion of your grade will be given an "average" grade of C.
